## Earl Jamieson

Earl Jamieson was born on the family farm in South Moline Township, Illinois, May 5, 1877. He attended public schools in Moline and was graduated with honors from Hahnemann Medical College of Chicago in 1905. He served his internship at Cook County Hospital and worked as a physician for a time at the Hull House Settlement in Chicago. He received a Doctorate in Medicine and Surgery from the University of Illinois, Chicago Campus in June 1908.

Soon after, he opened his medical practice in Walnut Grove, Minnesota. He married Mary Blanche Walker on October 7, 1915. She died on January 21, 1916.



Earl served as a captain in the Medical Corps of the United States Army during WWI at Travis, Texas from September 1917 until March 1918. In April of 1919 he married Hazel Jones of Mankato. They had one daughter, Doris born July 25, 1920.

He was elected President of the Redwood-Brown Medical Society in 1922.

Earl died July 17, 1937 of meningitis following a minor operation to remove a growth in his nose. He had served the small community of Walnut Grove and the surrounding area as a general physician and leading citizen for 30 years. He is buried in the Minneopa Cemetery, Mankato, Minnesota.
